7. Establishment of External Relations

7.1. Institutional Collaborations through MoU

As a relatively young University, international linkages with other universities, institutions and relevant organizations is of high priority. The Royal University of Bhutan in 2019-2020 signed eight Memorandum of Understandings for the following areas of collaboration as follows (Table 29):

8. Diversification of Revenue Streams

As an autonomous university, RUB within its mandate has to ensure sustainability and should not solely be dependent on the per student cost rolled out by the government but rather explore diverse sources of funding. To initiate this, the colleges have to put strategies in place to diversify different sources of income, either through the use of services, academic competence or through research and monitor income for the enhancement of the college and its autonomy.

One of the ways of generating fund at the DRIL offices of the University is through the facilitation of study abroad opportunities for international students and exploring research through various sources of competent funding. Such initiatives have already started at the University, but now enhanced efforts will have to be put in place to attract more students and research funding.
